
ABOUT THE BOOK

In The Generous Fish, a boy named Reuven takes a verse from scripture to "cast your bread upon the waters" (Ecclesiastes 11:1) quite literally. The result is a giant talking fish with golden scales. Boy and fish spend idyllic days together until the villagers realize those scales are real gold. Every villager has a good reason to ask for one. Devorah needs clothes for her children. Old Joseph needs money for a cane. The fish says he has plenty to share. But he grows weak from giving away too much, too fast. Can Reuven stand up to the village and save his friend?


ABOUT THE ILLUSTRATOR

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ACTIVITIES

- 1. Research an endangered animal or insect. Learn how to help protect it.
- 2. Go on a hike and enjoy nature.
- 3. Plant a tree and/or an indigenous garden.
- 4. Start a compost pile to recycle food waste from your kitchen.
- 5. Collect food or clothing to help others.
- 6. Discuss everyday acts of kindness (e.g. holding doors open, carrying packages, sharing, etc.).

Discussion Questions

- 1. What made the fish grow so big?
- 2. Why did Reuven ask the giant fish to share his golden scales?
- 3. What restored the giant fish back to health? What did the fish need to get well?
- 4. The rabbi said, "all creatures are important." What did he mean by this?
- 5. Every villager who asked for a golden scale had a good reason. No one meant to make the fish sick. What does this say about taking too much from one source? Are there times when you should put aside your own needs for the health of someone else or the environment?
- 6. Reuven was not sure he could stand up to the villagers and protect the golden fish. Have you ever tried to protect an animal from harm? How did you feel?
- 7. "Cast your bread upon the waters" is from a wise saying in the Book of Ecclesiastes. If you follow this instruction, you make decisions to be kind without expecting an immediate reward. Has a stranger's kindness ever made a difference in your life? Can you describe a time when a friend helped you or made you feel better when you were sad?
- 8. What can you do to protect the environment? Can you reduce trash? Could you use less plastic, energy, or water?
